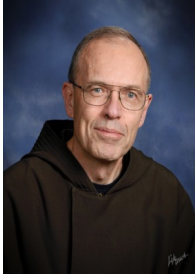

## FROM FATHER JIM'S DESK



### Holy Week

Today, **Palm Sunday**, we begin **Holy Week** which is the most solemn week of the year. By participating in the liturgical celebrations of this week, and by taking time to reflect on the events by which Jesus brought about our salvation, we will come to better understand God's great love for us.

The **Mass of the Lord's Supper** on **Holy Thursday** begins the **Easter Triduum** of the passion and resurrection of Christ. The **Easter Vigil** at St. Anthony's is the high point of the entire liturgical year and it is when the Church grows in numbers and in grace in the celebration of the **Sacraments of Initiation** (Baptism, Confirmation and the Holy Eucharist).

Note the times and the places for the **Holy Week** services: **Mass of the Lord's Supper** is at St Anthony Church at **7:00 PM** on **Thursday, April 17**, followed by a period of adoration until **10:00 PM**. The **Celebration of the Lord's Passion** on **Good Friday, April 18** is at **3:00 PM** at St. Anthony Church and **Stations of the Cross** are at **Noon** at St. Anthony and at **7:00 PM** at Our Lady of the Hills Church. The **Easter Vigil** is at **8:30 PM** on Saturday, **April 19**, at St. Anthony Church. **Easter Sunday Masses** are at their regularly scheduled times. There are no morning Masses on Thursday and Friday and Saturday and no Saturday evening Mass at 5:30 PM at St. Anthony. **Confessions** will be heard at St. Anthony after stations on **Good Friday** until **1:30 PM**.

You are invited to bring **Easter Food Baskets** to St. Anthony Church for the blessing of food on **Holy Saturday, April 19** at **11:30 AM**.

We will have a **Holy Hour** from **3 to 4 PM** on **Divine Mercy Sunday, April 27**, at St. Anthony Church. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed on the altar for the Holy Hour, the **Chaplet of Divine Mercy** will be prayed and confessions will be heard. Devotion to the **Divine Mercy** can transform our lives by drawing us ever closer to Jesus. "**Jesus, I trust in You.**"

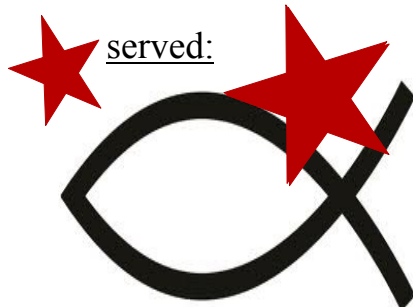
"The Governor's veto does not reflect the majority opinion of the state legislature, who worked hard this session to do more to help children in poverty and protect life, particularly unborn children."

## FOOD FOR THOUGHT

### APPLE STUFFED CHICKEN

#### BREAST

2 skinless and boneless chicken  
breasts

½ cup chopped apple (I used Gala)

2 tablespoons shredded Cheddar  
cheese

1 tablespoon Italian-style dried bread  
crumbs (always store in freezer)

1 tablespoon butter

¼ cup dry white wine

¼ cup water

1 tablespoon water

1 ½ teaspoons corn starch

1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley  
for garnish (I did not use)

#### Directions:

1. Combine apple, cheese and bread  
crumbs. Set aside.

2. Flatten chicken breast between  
sheets of wax paper to ¼ inch thick-  
ness. Divide apple mixture between  
chicken breast, roll up each chicken  
breast. Secure with 3 toothpicks.

3. Melt butter in a 7- inch skillet over  
medium heat. Brown stuffed chicken  
breast on each side. Add wine and ¼  
cup water. Cover, simmer for 15-20  
minutes, or until chicken is no longer  
pink. (7" skillet is important if only  
doing 2 chicken breasts)

4. Transfer chicken to each plate,  
Combine 1 tablespoon water and  
cornstarch (in very sm. bowl); stir  
into juices in pan. Cook and stir until  
thickened. Pour gravy over chicken,  
garnish with parsley if desired.

## ST. STANISLAUS — 1030—1079

Anyone who reads the history of Eastern Europe cannot help but chance on the name of Stanislaus, the saintly but tragic bishop of Kraków, patron of Poland. He is remembered with Saints Thomas More (June 22) and Thomas Becket (December 29) for vigorous opposition to the evils of an unjust government.

Born in Szczepanow near Kraków on July 26, 1030, he was ordained a priest after being educated in the cathedral schools of Gniezno, then capital of Poland, and at Paris. He was appointed preacher and archdeacon to the bishop of Kraków, where his eloquence and example brought about real conversion in many of his penitents, both clergy and laity. He became bishop of Kraków in 1072.

During an expedition against the Grand Duchy of Kiev, Stanislaus became involved in the political situation of Poland. Known for his outspokenness, he aimed his attacks at the evils of the peasantry and the king, especially the unjust wars and immoral acts of King Boleslaus II.

The king first excused himself, then made a show of penance, then relapsed into his old ways. Stanislaus continued his open opposition in spite of charges of treason and threats of death, finally excommunicating the king. The latter, enraged, ordered soldiers to kill the bishop. When they refused, the king killed him with his own hands.

Forced to flee to Hungary, Boleslaus supposedly spent the rest of his life as a penitent in the Benedictine abbey in Osiak.

#### **COMMENT:**

John the Baptist, Thomas Becket, Thomas More and Stanislaus are a few of the prophets who dared to denounce corruption in high places. They follow in the footsteps of Jesus himself, who pointed out the moral corruption in the religious leadership of his day. It is a risky business: "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone..." (John 8:7b).
